3. Chairpersons Report

Chairpersons Report

The inaugural year for University and Tertiary Sport NZ (UTSNZ) has been challenging but the Board and Executive Director are delighted by the many people and organisations that are welcoming and excited by the return of a new University and Tertiary organisation to the NZ sport sector. In year one, UTSNZ has already brought together Tertiary institutions and Sport organisations, already increased the profile of tertiary sport and alongside this profile increased the healthy questioning as to UTSNZ positioning within NZ sport.

We are extremely well led by our Executive Director, Sarah Anderson, who was appointed in March 2016. Sarah has worked exceptionally hard and is thoroughly committed to developing success for UTSNZ. Thanks to the UTSNZ Board who are now tasked with transforming from dealing with many operational matters in year one of UTSNZ to the development and implementation of the new UTSNZ strategic plan in 2017. Special mention to the members, especially the sport managers, plus the Student Athlete Commission, who have worked with Sarah on policies and worked tirelessly at their respective Universities to recruit and manage teams for the UTSNZ events. the National Tertiary Sport Championships.

The Business Case approved by the University Vice-Chancellor's in 2015 formed the basis of annual plans for UTSNZ in 2016 so this will be used as a reference in this report.

The primary purpose of UTSNZ was to build and support inter campus sport in the tertiary sector. In 2016, UTSNZ made a very strong step forward with regard to this outcome by:

1. The delivery of nine National Tertiary Championships at four different NZ University locations. The nine sports were 3x3 basketball, futsal, rugby sevens, badminton, table tennis, volleyball, 5x5 basketball, netball and hockey. Acknowledgement to our partner National Sport Organisations (NSO): NZ Rugby, Basketball NZ, Netball NZ, Badminton NZ, Table Tennis NZ, Hockey NZ, Volleyball NZ and NZ Football. The critical component is the signing of MOU's between the NSO's and UTSNZ to ensure the longevity of support and resource directed towards both national and international event opportunities for NZ tertiary students, as well as genuine integration of tertiary activity into NSO planning and pathways. After a four-year sabbatical, the 93-year-old UTSNZ shield was awarded to the University of Auckland as the 2016 UTSNZ Overall National Tertiary Champions. The suite of nine events succeeded in engaging the full spectrum of its stakeholders with each of NZ's eight Universities attending at least National Tertiary Championship. The winning of the specific sport championships being shared by Auckland University of Technology, Lincoln University, University of Auckland, and Victoria University of Wellington.

2. The facilitation and participation by NZ tertiary students in nine international World University Championship events in countries all across the globe. These international experiences provided another unique opportunity for student athletes and athlete support to gain a sense of pride in representing their respective tertiary institutions, as well as institutions the opportunity to enhance the student experience through lifelong learning experiences from both a sport and cultural diversity viewpoint.

All eight NZ Universities, plus three ITP's, had a representative at a World University Championship event. Our best results were a silver medal at the World University Rowing Championships and a bronze medal at the World University Karate Championships.

We have identified that inadequate lead-in time for both national and international events impacted on University team attendance. However, it was acknowledged, in the Business Case, that an amount of pragmatism would be required "to get something going" in 2016.

The Board consists of five members, 2 of which are enrolled university or tertiary institute students at the time of their election or co-option. UTSNZ Constitution allows for up to an additional three members to be co- opted by the board. In 2017, the Board may seek external Board members once skill gaps are identified after the completion of the new UTSNZ strategic plan. The Board held five ordinary meetings. In order for the Board to receive feedback, UTSNZ held two member forums and the Student Athlete Commission (SAC) was established.

UTSNZ successfully secured incorporated status in September 2016. Plus, UTSNZ are an eligible investment entity as recognised by government agency Sport New Zealand (in acknowledgment of appropriate governance and organisation processes being in place).

UTSNZ officially took over the international affiliation to FISU (the International Federation of University Sport) from the former NZ university sport entity, USNZ. Therefore, UTSNZ is responsible for sanctioning the entry of all NZ delegations to World University Championship and World University Games events.

In June 2016, UTSNZ launched the UTSNZ brand. The design centers around the core brand element of the triple linked rings. These are a reference to the Olympic rings and are a symbol of the drive for success, to better ourselves and represent our home towns, universities, polytechnics and country in top level competition. The World University Games are also deemed a stepping stone to Commonwealth and Olympic representation by our student athletes, so the 3 rings of UTSNZ precede the step up to the 5 Olympic rings and represent this pathway. The colouration of these being gold, silver and bronze reinforces this metaphor and provides the base palette for professional looking promotional material of a standard expected of a national level organisation.

The new UTSNZ strategic plan, to be discussed under General Business, currently being developed focuses on a vision of "All New Zealand Tertiary Students realising their sporting potential". Gratitude to Sport NZ who provided the services of John Page to facilitate our strategic planning process. Special mention to John, his expertise in sport governance and strategic planning has hugely benefited this process. As a result, the Board are looking forward to having a clear, concise vision that this new strategy will provide and plan to seize the momentum created in 2016 by you - the member Universities, the Institute of Technologies and the National Sport Organisations – to continue to build and support competitive inter tertiary sport within New Zealand and Internationally.

Finally, I would like to thank the tertiary students who participated at National Tertiary Championships and World University Championship events in 2016. Please share your stories to inspire others to represent their institution and play inter-tertiary sport.

At the heart of UTSNZ are our tertiary student athletes, and increasingly in the world of sport the athlete's voice is being formally recognised in the governance structures of national sporting entities.

Acknowledging this, in 2016 UTSNZ established the first NZ Tertiary Student Athlete Commission allowing the voice of students to be effectively communicated with UTSNZ.

Made up of one representative from each of NZ's eight Universities, selections and appointments were based on the student athlete's sporting participation and achievements, standing within each of their respective tertiary institutions and the skills and attributes they will bring to the group.

The key objectives of the commission (as per the formal Terms of Reference) are to:

- (i) To advise the board on matters pertaining to student sports participation and achievement
- (ii) To provide a vehicle for student voice and participation in the development of university and tertiary sport

6. Treasurers Report

Treasurer's Report

2016 was the first year of operation for the new entity. 93% of the income was derived from member levies and 5% came from participation fees in the national events. The success for some students in being selected to participate in the international arena has however presented some financial challenges for the students. The Executive Director has had to respond accordingly with recommendations which were accepted by the Board about a loan and repayment policy. This is an issue which had not been anticipated and will require improve financial planning in the future. The audit report has highlighted several other improvements which need to be addressed, none of which are material. The auditors' recommendations include ensuring segregation of duties, appropriate review and authorisation, establishing an interest register and a formal write-off policy. All of which are accepted as good practice.

Costs have been well managed and a solid surplus of \$31,614 (17.5% of gross revenue) is a good achievement. This may not be sustainable in future years as it has been largely due to the Executive Director's careful approach in an inaugural year when there were many unknowns.
